W. Clarke Conway Retires After 23 Years on the City Council, 5 Times as Mayor - The Most in Brisbane's History to Date

Council welcomes Councilmember Coleen Mackin, Elects Councilmember Cunningham as Mayor and Councilmember Lentz as Mayor Pro Tem

The December 10, 2020 City Council Meeting was a late one, as it was W. Clarke Conway's final meeting, and many from the community joined via Zoom to share fond memories, show their support, and recount the many ways Clarke has inspired and supported them. Here are some accounts, followed by his Proclamation:

"You haven't been a friend to just me, you've been a friend to our entire city...This town is so much better off with having you being a part of it." – COUNCILMEMBER LENTZ

"From the moment you began this job I almost immediately began dreading this day - the day that Clarke would retire. The day I feel like in some ways the training wheels of our 'City Council bike' would come flying off." - COUNCILMEMBER MADISON DAVIS

PROCLAMATION

A PROCLAMATION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRISBANE RECOGNIZING W. CLARKE CONWAY FOR HIS SERVICE TO THE CITY OF BRISBANE

WHEREAS, W. Clarke Conway was born and raised in Brisbane. Both of his parents were actively involved in the community – his father was elected to the original City Council in 1961 when Brisbane became a city and his mother fought against the garbage incinerator and helped dozens of kids participate in sporting events; and

WHEREAS, he and his wife Liz are raising their two youngest granddaughters in Brisbane who continue to thrive and share their talents with the community; and

WHEREAS, W. Clarke Conway has served on the City Council for 23 years, beginning his service on November 22, 1993. He served on the City of Brisbane City Council from 1993-2001, retired for four years and served again from 2005 to present. He first served as Mayor of Brisbane from 1996 – 1997, and then again from 2000-2001, 2009-2010, 2013-2014, and 2017-2018 making him the longest-serving Council Member and holding the most mayoral positions in Brisbane's history to date; and

WHEREAS, as a Mayor and Council Member, he ensured everyone felt heard and advocated on behalf of Brisbane on a regional and statewide scale, bringing his historical knowledge of Brisbane to the forefront of discussions. W. Clarke Conway always brought his sense of humor, positivity, wisdom, and common sense to all deliberations of the Council; and

WHEREAS, his goals included providing excellent recreation opportunities for Brisbane citizens, preserving the City's Open Space, and being a champion for local voices; and

WHEREAS, his work resulted in projects and improvements of great benefit to the City such as the Community Swimming Pool, the Skate Park, the former Teen Center, and the new Brisbane Library, where operations will soon be starting in a great new building with gathering places, public art, a maker space, outdoor areas, and quiet reading rooms. He also was pivotal in the creation of the Youth Advisory Committee, and the cooperative agreements with the Jefferson Union High School District, the Brisbane School District, and the San Mateo County Library System that have resulted in enhanced curriculum, after school activities, availability and upkeep of ball fields, and improved library services; and

WHEREAS, his leadership resulted in the establishment and continued funding for a permanent Open Space Fund, and the formation and leadership of the Open Space and Ecology Committee; and

WHEREAS, he provided key leadership to the City Council, City staff and the Community in the difficult decisions leading up to Measure JJ that establishes parameters for the future development of the Brisbane Baylands; and

WHEREAS, all the long he was a frugal steward of City finances and resources and played a critical role in many budgetary and fiscal decisions that have kept the City in sound financial condition, able to meet our obligations; and

WHEREAS, he shared in the efforts establishing the North County Fire Authority, the Joint Powers Agreement with San Mateo County, Cities, and Fire Districts establishing the San Mateo Pre-Hospital Emergency Services Providers Group, the Shuttle Bus Service for the Crocker Park/BART Shuttle Program, the Library JPA with San Mateo County and various San Mateo County Cities, the County-Wide Automatic Aid System; and

WHEREAS, he presided over many City celebrations such as the City's Annual Veterans' Day Flag-Raising Event, City Anniversary Celebrations, and the Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony of the City's first Fast EV Charger installed at the Shopping Center. He was also the first to sign a Mayoral Proclamation celebrating Black History Month.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the City Council of the City of Brisbane hereby thanks its esteemed colleague for his generosity in giving an abundance of his time, dedication, and extreme fortitude to the city he holds so close to his heart.

A PROCLAMATION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRISBANE RECOGNIZING MAYOR TERRY O'CONNELL FOR HER SERVICE TO THE CITY OF BRISBANE - 2020

WHEREAS, Terry O'Connell served as the Mayor of the City of Brisbane from December 12th, 2019 to December 10th, 2020; and

WHEREAS, during very unprecedented times she led the City with grace. Her calm leadership style has inspired many to remain strong as we weather this COVID-19 pandemic together; and

WHEREAS, during her year as Mayor she presided over numerous City Council meetings and City events, most of which required tremendous flexibility as we pivoted to hold them safely virtually, and she continued to actively listen to the needs of the community members. She also co-hosted with fellow Councilmembers Virtual Town Halls to stay connected with residents during the pandemic and pass along resources and information being shared on regular calls with the County Manager's Office as well as the Health Department. And approved with her fellow Councilmembers, safety improvements to open space, neighborhood streets, pedestrian routes, and the City's dog park; and

WHEREAS, she spent many hours working to solve issues and explore new projects for Council consideration as part of her work in numerous Council Subcommittees and County assignments, including the following: the Airport Land Use Committee, Airport Community Roundtable, Association of Bay Area Governments, League of California Cities, Brisbane Baylands Community Advisory Group, North County Fire Authority Board of Directors/Fire Services, Caltrain Modernization Local Policy Maker Group, SMC Pre-Hospital EMS Group, Airport Noise Subcommittee, Planning Issues Subcommittee, Fiscal and Administrative Policy Subcommittee, Infrastructure, Utilities & Franchise Subcommittee, Cannabis Issues Ad Hoc, LUNAFEST Film Festival Ad Hoc Committee, Sierra Point Design Guidelines Ad Hoc Subcommittee, Liaison to Open Space and Ecology Committee; Liaison to Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, she remained a strong advocate for the City of Brisbane on the County, State, and National levels. She firmly opposed the California High Speed Rail Authority's proposal to locate a railyard in Brisbane and joined the Climate Mayors' call for bold action to protect our planet and build a more just economy in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, under her leadership, the City also responded to the global social movement calling an end to police brutality and racial injustice with the adoption of a Resolution affirming the City's commitment to stand in solidarity with the Black community and condemn racism; and

WHEREAS, as Mayor, she hosted many City-wide events marking important milestones. This past July, she received on behalf of the City the Reach Code Award for Innovation from Sustainable San Mateo County. She hosted the first Black Lives Matter special flagraising ceremony. She also presided over the New Brisbane Library Dedication Ceremony. One of her final acts as Mayor was lighting the Festival Tree at the City's 34th Annual Festival of Lights where she was accompanied by Volunteers of the Year, Joe Sulley and Vicki Smith.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that after a year of dedicated service as Mayor of the City of Brisbane, we thank Mayor O'Connell for her dedication and leadership to her community as she reminded us of our personal responsibilities to ensure we continue to move forward safely and ultimately, more resilient than we have ever been before.

Brisbane Rental Assistance Program

At the December 10th City Council Meeting, the Council directed staff to set up a rental assistance program to support lower-income households that have been negatively affected by COVID-19. The program will open in early January, and will be administered by Samaritan House, with Brisbane's Core Service Agency processing the applications. Eligibility

Live in Brisbane

Income at 80% or lower of Annual Median Income (Family of 4 = \$139,200)

Not related to Landlord

Have a signed rental agreement

Was current with rent as of March 16, 2020 (no pending evictions)

Have accumulated past due rent

Not receiving other COVID-19 related rental assistance

Savings not available to cover past due rent

Grant Amount

Maximum of \$4,000 per family

Up to 80% of the amount owed

Payment will be made to the Landlord

Landlord will need to forgive the remaining rent up to \$5,000

Example: Renter owes \$2,500 in past due rent. City provides Landlord \$2,000 and the remaining \$500 is forgiven.

Example: Renter owes \$8,000 in rent. City provides

Landlord \$4,000. Landlord forgives an additional

\$1,000. Renter still owes \$3,000.



The goal is to support up to 25 residents/families and that they are able to stay in the community. Should we get more applications than available funds, priority will be given to:

Families with children under the

- → age of 18 living in the unit
- → Those with pre-existing medical conditions which are impacted by the pandemic

Accessory Dwelling Units in Brisbane



The City of Brisbane recently updated its accessory dwelling unit (ADU) ordinance in compliance with new State legislation. The changes, which took effect at the beginning of this year, generally make ADUs much simpler to build in California. Perhaps the most significant change was the introduction of a special group of ADUs that the City of Brisbane refers to as "unrestricted ADUs". These unrestricted ADUs are not subject to lot coverage or Floor Area Ratio, meaning that no matter how one's lot and home are situated, an ADU is still a possibility. Concurrent with the adoption of the new ADU ordinance, the City's ADU webpage, www.brisbaneca.org/ADU has also been revamped. The new webpage includes helpful information and resources pertaining to ADUs as well as the City's new, all-in-one ADU Compendium: brisbaneca.org/ADUCompendium. The Compendium indicates what zones may have an ADU, provides development regulations for ADUs, and includes a comprehensive checklist, plan set submittal guide, and additional ADU resources such as inspirational ideas and an ADU calculator. If you are interested in building an ADU in Brisbane, the City's updated ADU webpage and new Compendium will help you get started.

Look Out for A Residential Design Preference Survey in January!



What design elements do **you** like to see in any new residential development in Brisbane? Setbacks and yards between the building and the street? Balconies or dormers that break up tall building walls? Landscaping that provides screening? Do your design preferences depend on where the residential development may be located?


The City will be publishing a **Residential Design Preference Community Survey in mid-January** on the SB2 Planning Grant Implementation Program (PGIP) webpage, **brisbaneca.org/sb2**. We want all residents to share their preferences for how future new residential development will look and fit in to the community when the survey is published.

As we shared in the December STAR, the SB2 PGIP is a State-funded program to update the City's zoning regulations and procedures related to housing

development to comply with new State laws that require our housing design standards to be **objective**. Objective standards require no interpretation or personal judgment, as opposed to subjective standards that are subject to interpretation and which may cause different people to disagree based on their personal perspectives and opinions.

You may have seen Tony Press walking...down to the Farmers' Market, over to Madhouse, and recently, completing contactless deliveries of his book, Crossing the Lines. In addition to writing short stories, and helping keep his fellow residents informed (and entertained) on the Residents of Brisbane Facebook Group, Tony serves his community as a Board Member of Brisbane Village Helping Hands and the Friends of the Brisbane Library. When we kept bumping into Tony – both while out and online, we wanted to learn more about his writings and what's helped him keep going during this time.



When did you start writing? Did you always want to be an author?

I've always been a reader - an early elementary teacher complained to my mom that "he reads a lot, but only baseball books," and my mom said: "he reads, doesn't he?" I was an English major in my long-ago undergraduate days at UCLA, simply because I continued to enjoy reading — it wasn't my idea of a career path. I didn't really start writing until the early 2000's, partly due to some memories that arose during meditation.

What inspires your writing or stories?

My stories, and my occasional poems, often are sparked by events in my life, even quite minor ones, but also sometimes from something I might overhear, in a cafe, or on the California Zephyr heading to or from Burlington, lowa, where my wife, Karuna, is from. So, be careful, I guess, if you're sitting near me at Madhouse, if/when we can do that again. I often say "I write stories when I have questions, and poems when I think I have answers, thus, mostly stories." And I know my writing helps me continue to learn, about myself and the wider world.

How long have you lived in Brisbane?

We arrived in Brisbane only about eight years ago and I've never loved a place more. We had lived in the fog of Daly City for fourteen years, so the sunshine is part of it, but truly, it's the people.

What do you want people to leave feeling after reading your stories?

I'd like my readers to come away with a bit of connection, however small, to a character or characters, or a situation/ question, and/or also to the setting. Many of my tales (but not all) take place far away — Spain, Mexico, England, Wisconsin, Iowa, Texas — I've been lucky to travel and when I have, I'm often scribbling the beginnings of new pieces. On the road, in new locations, my eyes and ears are just a bit more open.

How can people get a copy of your book?

As local folks know, and probably are quite tired of, I often post Facebook reminders of my (so far) only book, *CROSSING THE LINES*, which is a collection of my stories. Yes, I'm working on "the novel" and I'll get back to you when/if it is really ready for publication. There are few things I love more than walking around town and dropping a book onto a porch, or into a mailbox (but only if you requested/ordered one, I promise!). So, people can contact me directly (my favorite option) or order through an indy bookstore — it's on some local shelves, like Kepler's and Florey's, or if you must, there's that Amazon place (my least favorite option, but it's there). Also, at no charge, it's in our beloved Brisbane Library! As noted in a Jamie Ford novel: "Libraries are like candy stores except everything is free." And I can't wait to go inside our new one.

And lastly, what keeps you or has kept you going during this time?

This has been the craziest and scariest year of my life, no question, but I continue to rejoice in, and gain strength from, the kindness and generosity of people around me. On my block alone, and throughout the town, I both witness and experience acts of compassion, again and again. I was a teacher and I always said, "We teach best by example." I'm seeing it, am grateful for it, and doing my best to be of service to others, as they have been to me. \(\psi\)

And The Winners Are...

The Recycled Arts and Crafts Contest received almost 30 submissions, some including numerous similar works, from the crafty Brisbane community. The judges, sustainability and Parks and Rec staff from the City and SSF Scavenger Company, were impressed at the creativity and resourcefulness of the entries, and encourage everyone to view the contributions at brisbaneca.org/recycled-arts-crafts-contest.

The Grand Prize is awarded to Leesa Greenlee's Fish Mobile. Leesa's submission noted, "It is a mobile illustrating the plight of our oceans and the life within choking on plastic and trash. The entire mobile is made of garbage from my household and some donated by neighbors." The judges agreed that her work epitomized the contest goals of turning trash into treasure and making a statement about the harmful impacts of waste. "This piece stands out for so many reasons. It utilized non-recyclable materials, is stunning to look at, and displays a creature negatively affected by our excessive plastic consumption and overfishing."

The judges selected two pieces for Runner Up: Recycled Scrap Quilt by Cindy Rudolph, a "classic and beautiful" piece which turned hard-to-recycle fabrics

into a usable everyday item, and Goddess of Takeout by Madison Davis, a creative "statement about takeout food waste" that is "so 2020."

Also recognized as Honorable Mentions were Barbara Ebel's Plastic Birds and Fish made from broken mini-blinds, "possibly the most original medium," and Mermaid by Sarah Fitzgerald and Dennis Lien, an "attractive, impactful piece which beautified a boring old retaining wall."

With all the interest and wonderful submissions we received, we are thinking to make the contest an annual event, with future submissions possibly being shown in the City Hall Art Gallery or at Day in the Park. Upgrade Coming to City Signboards

The city signboards will be getting a nice, environmentally-friendly upgrade in early 2021 with electronic signboards! This was a collaborative effort of the Open Space and Ecology Committee and the Parks and Recreation Commission to ensure the new boards wouldn't result in light pollution and would be an attractive fit for the surrounding areas. Not to mention, pivot away from spending the \$20k/ year it takes to operate the current signboards and which require the use of non-recyclable thermal paper. New roofing (cedar shingles to preserve the look/feel of the original structure) took place last month. We are excited about this upgrade and the ease that will be afforded in keeping the community updated on community notices, emergency alerts, and city news and happenings. Prior to the electronic signboards going in, the old signboards will be temporarily attached to the new posts so community messages can still be posted.



Community Workshop #2 for Crocker Park Trail: January 19, 6:30pm



The City and design team would like to thank everyone who attended the first virtual community workshop for the Crocker Park Recreational Trail Master Plan and those who provided input via the community survey.

During the community workshop held on the evening of October 21, 2020, City staff and the design team provided a project background and held a live engagement survey to understand how the trail is currently being used, which amenities are desired, and the community's vision for the trail. Throughout the workshop, there were nineteen (19) participants actively engaged in the live survey and discussion. Following the meeting, the survey remained available until November 4, 2020, both online and via a hard copy of the survey, which could be dropped off at City Hall, the Sunrise Room, and the Farmer's Market. An additional seventy-two (72) community members participated in the online survey and six (6) completed the hard copy survey. In total, ninety-seven (97) responses were received across the various platforms.

This survey information, along with guidance received from the stakeholder groups, a biological constraints assessment, and a traffic analysis memorandum has informed the design team who are preparing the preliminary master plan, and which will be shared at the next workshop! Please join us to see the progress of the draft master plan and provide input to help guide the future character of the Crocker Park Trail.
