Volunteer of the Year

Each year, the City recognizes a Brisbane resident as its "Volunteer of the Year". After carefully reviewing nominations and letters of recommendation from residents, an ad hoc subcommittee comprised of City Councilmembers and Parks & Recreation Commissioners selects a recipient. The Volunteer of the Year award is bestowed upon a dedicated community member who has demonstrated ongoing commitment to the City of Brisbane. They act with the purpose of community in mind and give selflessly to others.

This year's recipient is known throughout the community for their contributions in many areas and is devoted to personally improving the quality of life for Brisbane residents. This individual is always there with a helping hand, bright smile, and great attitude.

As a true steward of building community here in Brisbane, she has served on the Parks & Recreation Commission, been an active member of the Brisbane Lions Club, and fills a current seat on the Brisbane School Board. It doesn't stop there! For many years, this individual has volunteered her time at countless City-wide events as a DJ extraordinaire. She's front & center as the heart of the DJ dance nights in the park for the concert series, and she's working hard behind the scenes at events like the Festival of Lights to provide audio and visual services. As a founding member of the LUNAFEST event subcommittee, she has helped to raise over \$86,000 the past three years for Brisbane women pursuing degrees in male-dominated fields.

This past year, she was instrumental in establishing the Brisbane Covid Response Coalition, or BCRC, to provide services to Brisbane residents and support them through the challenges presented by the pandemic. She set up a website in record time and implemented a system whereby residents could request help and other community members could volunteer to assist. Volunteers were matched with those needing help and services were rendered to ensure that everyone's basic needs within our community were being met.

This year's Volunteer of the Year works tirelessly to make a difference in our community. She is giving of her time, energy, and effort to improve the quality of life for people of all ages and demographics. She is selfless and represents the true spirit of this award. After many years of volunteerism in our community, we take this opportunity to express our gratitude by formally presenting the Volunteer of the Year Award to none other than Sharon Boggs!


Pie-Eating Contest

Youth Climate Ambassador: Cassandra Bousquet

Cassandra, Angelica, and Katie are high school seniors at Mercy Burlingame, and current San Mateo County Youth Climate Ambassadors. The Youth Climate Ambassador (YCA) program is offered by the San Mateo County's Office of Sustainability, the San Mateo County Office of Education, Peninsula Clean Energy, and the Citizens Environmental Council. This year-long youth leadership program provides students with the opportunity to dive into social and environmental issues contributing to the global climate crisis. When considering how they could make the most impact in the community, they realized bringing together local resources in one location would be the most impactful. When we heard that they were thinking to have this fair in the Brisbane Community Park*, on a Thursday during the hours of the farmers' market, we wanted to learn more...

How did the three of you meet?

We all go to Mercy High School Burlingame, but we got to know each other through the Youth Climate Ambassador program. We started our work as YCAs in January over Zoom, and we will have our capstone event this December.

What have you been learning as Youth Climate Ambassadors?

We have learned about the climate crisis in-depth, focusing on its causes and solutions. We have learned about renewable resources, local and global environmental and climate initiatives, and how to communicate the information we have been learning with others so that we can drive change and make a positive impact on our world. We have been mentored to be leaders and given the skills to empower others to be leaders, as well. The first half of the program revolved around making sure we were educated about the climate crisis, and the second half is centered around implementing a community impact project, or real, specific action that will help our communities fight against climate change.

Why did you decide to host a United Against Climate Change Fair?

We decided to host a United Against Climate Change Fair because we thought it would be the best way to reach our local community and spread awareness and empowerment about climate change. We understand that many people feel lost or hopeless when they think about the climate crisis, and that many would like to



take action but don't know how or where to start. By creating a space where people can learn more about the crisis and what they can do to fight against it, we feel that together, as a community, we can create widespread change. One especially powerful thing that I have learned from the YCA program is that it is absolutely possible to stop climate change. We just have to actively stand united against it. It isn't easy, and we are rapidly running out of time, but it is still possible. We felt that the Brisbane Farmers' Market would be the ideal location since the farmers' market promotes eating locally, which cuts greenhouse gas emissions that otherwise would have gone into the atmosphere. The Community Park is also an established community gathering place, which makes it a wonderful space to share our message and mission.

Is there anything specific you want to mention about the fair?

I'd like to thank Brisbane resident Karen Lentz with Silverspot Graphics, who has helped us order t-shirts for a discounted price which will be available for free at the fair. I'd also liked to thank everyone involved with the Youth Climate Ambassadors program, especially our mentors Mike McCord and Desiree Thayer, as well as our United Against Climate Change Fair partners: the City of Brisbane, along with the City's Open Space and Ecology Committee, SSF Scavenger, the County of San Mateo's Office of Sustainability, Citizens Environmental Council of Burlingame, and Citizens Climate Lobby.

PLEASE DON'T FLUSH:


- Paper towels

Even though the label may say "disposable" or "flushable', these products can clog your sewer line and lead to costly repairs for the City's sanitary sewer system. We've seen a big increase in these items at our sewage pump stations recently, and we'd really appreciate your help spreading the word. Thanks!

What is GIS?

GIS stands for geographic information systems, and is a system that creates, manages, analyzes, and maps all types of data. GIS connects location data (where things are) with all types of descriptive information (what things are like there). This provides a foundation for mapping and analysis that is being utilized in hundreds of thousands of organizations in virtually every field to communicate, perform analysis, share information, and solve complex problems. This is changing the way the world works.

Everything from finding restaurants on your phone, to tracking COVID-19 cases and wildfires, is created using GIS.



Data-Driven

Most data has a geographic component. GIS integrates many different kinds of data layers (including imagery, spreadsheets, features, and tables) using spatial location.

Maps

Maps are the "geographic container" for these data layers. GIS maps are easily shared and embedded in apps, and they're accessible by virtually everyone, everywhere. Check out some Brisbane-specific maps at **brisbaneca.org/maps**!

Water Main Replacement Project Receives Recognition from American Public Works Association

In January 2020, the Water Main Replacement Project Phase 2 started on Kings, before moving to Margaret and Paul, and ultimately, Harold. This purpose of this project was to improve fire flow capacity in the upper streets and replace 5,120 linear feet of the City's then aging infrastructure.



When the Public Works Department began working on this project, which they knew was going to be largely disruptive at times for 68 residences in the project area due to water needing to be temporarily shut off for a temporary bypass to be installed and the aging 6" lines replaced with new 8" and 10" pipe, Engineering Technician Bob Sage set out to create what's called a "story map" using a software program called ArcGIS. Story maps are being embraced throughout the County, as is the case for the current Redistricting process, (see page 10) so that complex issues can be better understood and that better decisions can be made. Bob's story map served to visually inform the community about the project, which was able to be successfully completed in December of 2020. On October 20, 2021, Jerry Flanagan, Deputy Public Works Director (Utilities) and Bob attended an awards program hosted by the American Public Works Association, Silicon Valley Chapter, where the Water Main Replacement Project Phase 2 was recognized with an Honorable Mention for the Utilities (\$2M – \$5M) Category.



Congratulations to the Public Works Department for this honorary distinction!

Describe Your Community of Interest

What is redistricting?

Every ten years, electoral districts throughout the U.S. are redrawn to equalize the district populations. This process is called redistricting. It is important in ensuring that each Supervisor represents about the same number of constituents.

What is a Community of Interest?

A Community of Interest is a group of people that share a common bond or interest. It is a concentrated population that should be included within a single district for purposes of effective and fair representation. Communities of Interest may not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or candidates.

Examples of Communities of Interest:

- Senior citizens
- Recent immigrants from the same country / region
- LGBTQIA+ communities
- Residents who share a common language or culture
- People who use the same public transportation
- People who live in an industrial, rural or urban area
- People who use the same parks and recreation areas

How can you tell the County about your Community of Interest?



Reminder: Annual Winter Cleanup Weekend



Thank you for everyone who participated in 2020's cleanup event. Twenty (20) tons of yard waste were collected over the weekend by SSF Scavenger Co.!

This year's Annual Winter Clean Up Weekend is November 13 & 14, 2021.

This is the time to clear your property of fallen leaves and branches which could find their way into one of the City's storm drains and cause flooding during the rainy season.

Dumpsters will be placed throughout town for residents to dispose of their yard waste. See above map.

Please place your yard trimmings and branches (less than 4 inches in diameter and NOT within plastic garbage bags) into the nearest-located dumpster, which will be placed the Friday before.

If you need assistance, we will have limited staff available to transport your yard waste to one of the dumpsters. For assistance, please call (415) 508-2147 during the following times:

Saturday, November 13: 10:00 AM – 3:00 PM Sunday, November 14: 9:00 AM – 1:00 PM

Please remember that this is for YARD WASTE ONLY (leaves, branches, grass). NO GARBAGE OR OTHER WASTE is to be disposed of in these dumpsters. Doing so will make the entire load unrecyclable.

Do not attempt to trim tree branches that are touching or near PG&E power lines. Call PG&E if you have any questions or concerns at (800) 743-5000.

Once again, thank you for your cooperation in this City-wide effort. If we all pitch in to clean up our properties from yard trimmings and fallen leaves, we can prevent future problems from occurring in our storm drains, as well as keep our properties fire-safe.
