# 2021 State of the City Recap



Brisbane City Council Unanimous Vote

# Urgency Ordinance No.668 Passed

To Impose Higher Administrative Fines for Violations of the City's Short-Term Rental Ordinance Non-Urgency Ordinance also passed on 11/18/2021

First Time Violation: Fines up to \$1,500 Second Time Violation: Fines up to \$3,000 Third Time Violation and above: Fines up to \$5,000

It's been an extraordinary year for the City of Brisbane. Those who attended the hybrid State of the City on November 17, 2021 got a taste of that. Mayor Cunningham highlighted the importance of relationship-building, teamwork, as "nothing great is made alone", and went through a list of all that was accomplished in 2021 due to that collaborative, "can-do" attitude and approach. Here is a partial list of all that was achieved, in no particular order:

- The Brisbane Library Celebration and the City's 60th Anniversary Party
- Extended fire safety, with a 100 ft. perimeter around undeveloped parcels
- SamTrans Route 292 continuing into San Francisco
- Airbnb regulations and enforcement
- Our new electronic signboards
- Injecting JOY wherever we could throughout the pandemic
- Completion of the Roadway Fuel Reduction Project by North County Fire Authority working closely with Public Works
- Voted in favor of 5 new Diversity Caucuses at Calcities in Sacramento
- C/CAG Board members taking a very strong NO position on SB9 AND SB10
- The great comeback of the Brisbane Garden Show
- The return of the Summer Concerts in the Park Series, which included a Lions DJ Dance Party to kick off things off
- The Brisbane Derby and Day in the Park Community Festival

- The San Mateo Credit Union Ribbon-Cutting for the ATM at City Hall and subsequent on-site branch visits, the first of which took place in early November, with two more happening on December 7 and January 11.
   The latter was an on-the-spot idea from the Mayor at the SMCU ATM ribbon-cutting that took hold immediately and was implemented in less than two months
- The Ribbon-Cutting for Chef Reina, a hot new vegan spot on Visitacion
- Brisbane Chamber Mixers Starting Up Again In-Person
- The creation of IDEA (the Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Accountability Committee, the City's newest Committee, which is currently accepting applicants
- EPIC (Equity Plus Inclusion Committee) Driven
   Proclamations including those for Native American
   Heritage Month, Asian American
   and Pacific Islander Heritage Month, Hispanic
   Heritage Month, Mental Health Awareness Month, etc.
- BRISBANE 101, which took place on November 6th at City Hall with attendees whose ages spanned 8 decades (the youngest of which were 15!)
- Small business grants, with applications and distribution of funds managed by the Brisbane Chamber of Commerce
- LUNAFEST, which celebrated its 20th anniversary of films made by and about women

Following the Mayor's remarks, Finance Director Carolina Yuen gave a financial overview of the City. We exceeded the budgeted amounts in regards to Sales Tax, Property Tax, and Licenses & Permits, but were below revenue expectations when it came to Transit Occupancy Tax or Hotel Tax. 

# Meet Lise Dumont, Volunteer for Brisbane Village Helping Hands

Some may remember Lise Dumont as a photographer whose works were featured in the 2020 Artists' Evening of Sharing. Her photographs of sunsets, sunrises, plant life, wildlife and waterways – taken while commuting via bicycle from Brisbane to Genentech and back along the marina – were captivating.

Others may recall that Dumont and her pet parrots were vividly captured by artist Rosanna Lyons in a painting titled Goddess of Birds. Lyons' work has been featured through Artists' Evening of Sharing events and at Madhouse Coffeehouse, the Brisbane Marina and our City Hall (where Goddess of the Birds was among the paintings displayed).



These days, Dumont can also be seen helping local seniors as a volunteer with Brisbane Village Helping Hands (BVHH), where she is making a difference in her community.

Dumont was looking for a way to volunteer after retiring from Genentech in April, and discovered that BVHH offers an easy and convenient way of doing so.

"I liked that it's a simple way for people to help each other," she shares. "You don't have to commit to more than you can handle. It's kind of genius the way it's structured."



She appreciates that emails are sent out to vetted volunteers like herself, who can "accept" requests by simply checking a box if the assignment fits in with her schedule or interests. Volunteers can offer assistance for as much – or as little – as they have time for.

"I try to pick up at least one request a week," she says. "I love the flexibility. I enjoy driving, and if someone needs a ride to the doctor or someplace, I'm happy to do that."

Dumont is a people person. She was a communications professional for Genentech for 20 years and has also worked as a professional photographer. BVHH lets her enjoy meeting more people who reside in the town she loves.

"The village has definitely helped me to get to know more of my neighbors," she says.

Dumont fell in love with Brisbane years ago, when she came to a Toastmasters' meeting at Madhouse. She recalls thinking to herself, 'I could live here.' About eight years ago, she and her husband Graham Douglas bought a home in Brisbane, where they live with their two parrots, Gizmo and Cricket.

"One thing that was clear shortly after I moved here is that people here take care of each other," says Dumont. "I love that, and this is an easy way for me to contribute to that spirit. I find that helping people is one of the keys to happiness. Also, as someone who plans to stay in Brisbane, I know I may need the services of BVHH one day, so I'm happy to support it.

The goal of BVHH is helping older residents "age in place" and remain in their homes as long as possible by providing volunteer services like transportation, minor home maintenance and repair, help with technology and "friendly visits." When the pandemic lifts, social functions will resume so members and volunteers can mingle.

BVHH is currently welcoming new members and volunteers and has waived the \$20 membership dues in 2021 because of the pandemic.

## **Trash Into Treasure**

The Second Annual Brisbane Recycled Arts & Crafts Contest came to a close with roughly 20 submissions. Projects were judged on their creativity and material use by sustainability and Parks and Rec staff from the City and SSF Scavenger Company, as well as last year's grand prize winner and Parks and Rec Commissioner Leesa Greenlee.



Barbara Ebel's "Pumpkin King" was selected as the 1st Place winner. Judges felt the piece was creative, well-crafted, and very resourceful with an array of materials reused, saying "it's much better than something store bought, and is a good alternative for seasonal decorations."



Receiving 2nd Place was Cindy Rudolph's "Wall Hanging", a beautiful and wellexecuted piece, with judges noting that textile scraps are often difficult to recycle.



Dana Dillworth's "Small Images" were selected as 3rd Place winner as judges appreciated the "fun use of hard to recycle items" as a good way to keep items in circulation rather than the landfill.



A Youth Award was given to Silvio Santana for his "wind chimes" which embodied the spirit and intention of the contest. As he explained:

"While making my art piece, I had the recent California wildfires in mind. The wood serves as a symbol of the land and wildlife that has been affected. Wind is often a deciding factor in the course of these fires, so I thought a wind chime was appropriate. The keys represent all that has been lost..."



This year's contest also attracted international participation from India! Raiganj Ramchandra submitted several very intricate projects and has already received several awards in his home country. While not eligible for our contest awards, we appreciated his participation and hope his projects can both inspire future project ideas here in Brisbane as well as highlight the global challenge of excess waste.



Two Honorable Mentions were also recognized: Luis Logon's "Things Made of Waste" bench and the Coriano family's "ALL CAPS". The former utilized treated wood waste, which is very difficult to properly dispose of, while the latter involved a thoughtful family exercise of collecting and recognizing the amount of single-use containers, by way of their caps, over a short time and representing it with artwork.

Thanks to everyone that participated in this year's contest and congratulations to all the awardees! To the rest of the community--take a good look at your trash over the next several months and you too may find that there are treasures to be created. We look forward to seeing them next year!  $\widehat{\mathfrak{do}}$



# **Lighting Up City Hall**



You may have noticed that City Hall has been lit up with various colors starting in May 2020 for Mental Health Awareness Month (Green), Pride in June (Rainbow), and November for Native American Heritage Month (Yellow and Orange).

To celebrate the holidays, City Hall will be lit up on the following schedule:

- Hanukkah: blue & white from 11/28-12/6
- Christmas: green & red from 12/7-12/25
- Kwanzaa: green & red from 12/26-1/1

**Note:** The green & red lights will remain the same, but signify both winter holidays.

# **Housing Element Update News**

Whether you'll be looking for housing in Brisbane in the future or you already live in Brisbane, the City's Housing Element affects us all. The Housing Element provides the direction for how the City will provide for its future housing needs. It's the one element of the City's General Plan that is required by the State to be updated on 8 year cycles. As indicated in the State government code, "The availability of housing is a matter of vital statewide importance and the early attainment of decent housing and a suitable living environment for every Californian...is a priority of the highest order".

The next update cycle is in process for the years 2023-2031 and broad-based community input is needed to help ensure that it fairly addresses the City's projected housing needs. There have been several housing element educational sessions that have recently happened through our partnership with 21 Elements; "Let's Talk Housing" is the collaborative planning effort of San Mateo County





and the cities within the County. These sessions have including topics such as "Why Affordability Matters", "Housing and Racial Equity", and "Housing in a Climate of Change". If you missed any of these sessions, it's not too late to view them by simply following the weblinks from the City's 2023-2031 Housing Element Update webpage: <a href="mailto:brisbaneca.org/housing-element-update">brisbaneca.org/housing-element-update</a>.

Additionally, the Planning Commission will be hosting a virtual workshop on Thursday, December 16th, at 7:30 pm. In this workshop, we'll discuss our local demographic trends and how those trends tie into our housing needs. We'll also be introducing the "Balancing Act" tool.

Balancing Act is an online tool designed to gather input on preferences for potential areas of the City for development of new housing where housing may not be currently zoned.

Brisbane is small, but we have an obligation to accommodate a comparably large number of housing units. Through a process called the regional housing needs allocation (RHNA), Brisbane has been allocated a need of at least 1,588 housing units in this next housing element cycle.

Please join us online for this upcoming workshop at the Planning Commission on December 16th. More information will be provided in advance of this workshop, including how to join the meeting via links from the Housing Element Update webpage the Friday before meeting. A link to the Balancing Act tool will also be provided via a link from that same webpage.

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.



#### HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.



#### **HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING**

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



# Before Heading Out or to Bed

**Blow out** lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. **Turn off** all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

## **FACTS**

- ! More than **one-third** of home decoration fires are started by candles.
- ! More than two of every five decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.



Winter Clean Up 2021

Thank you to everyone who raked up their leaves and got their yard waste to the dumpsters located throughout town in mid-November!

SSF Scavenger collected 23 tons of green waste (3 more than the previous year)!
