RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

United Against Hate Week (Nov. 12-18, 2023) is a call for local civic action to stop the hate and implicit biases that are a dangerous threat to the safety and civility of our neighborhoods, towns and cities. Since inception, United Against Hate Week has spread to over 200+ communities including all of Los Angeles County, faith-based groups, LGBTQ and human rights organizations, and is beginning to takeoff throughout California and in communities across the U.S. The City of Brisbane has been a partner since 2022 and held a poetry reading event in partnership with SMC Libraries, Brisbane Library and Lyrical Opposition.

Manzanar: "Never Again " looks at the interconnected stories of Japanese internment during World War II, Sue Kunitomi Embrey's efforts to commemorate Manzanar internment camp, and the ongoing work of Manzanar National Historic Site to educate visitors about civil rights. At the heart of the of the film is the site's annual pilgrimage and the words of Sue Embrey, who speaks movingly about protecting all citizens' rights, especially in times of national crisis. Screen a Not In Our Town film or other film with a United Against Hate Week theme. Invite your friends, neighbors, social network, PTA, and/or student or faith group.

Communities have faced hate before and we can learn from one another. Screenings help provide a way for people to convene and open up the discussion about how to stand up to hate together. This event can be a launch pad for your ongoing activity.
